Sobriety to Go

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As often happens, we learn the most in AA from listening to our newer members, and my home group recently experienced a new dimension of the Fifth Tradition because of it.

We have a periodic group inventory, every four to six months, so that we can stay healthy as a group. We use the Traditions as well as some of the questions from the "AA Group", pamphlet as our guide. We pick a separate night and spend three or four hours checking our group pulse. At one of these inventory sessions, we had gotten to the Fifth Tradition when a member who had been with us for five months or so spoke up.

"I am confused," he said. "This Tradition says that 'Each group has but one primary purpose--to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.'" He paused a moment, then hesitantly said, "I have been attending this group recently for five months now, and we have never left this room!"

The result of this new member's wisdom and willingness to participate is that our group now sponsors a weekly meeting at a local treatment center. We carry our format and our group's message to them. From this weekly Twelfth Step activity, our group has grown as some of the alcoholics in the treatment center join with us when they leave treatment.

Our group has benefited in several ways other than new members. For a while, we saw an influx of nonalcoholics into the AA groups. Many of these came to us from treatment, having been told to just go to AA by well-meaning professionals who were not really familiar with what AA did and did not do. We have learned that we were at fault when this happened. If we do not show up to explain AA to new people, they will hear about it from people who do not know about AA.

This simple activity of carrying the message out of our meeting room also answered another problem we were having. Those of us who have been blessed by being in AA when there were plenty of "live" Twelfth Step calls talk a lot about them. Our younger members now have an inexhaustible supply of "live" Twelfth Step calls.

By regularly showing up at the treatment center in the spirit of cooperation, we are getting to know the professionals who *do* deal with problems other than alcohol. When someone shows up at our group who needs help of a different kind from that which we deliver, we can direct them to a person who can help, rather than just throwing them into the winds. This helps us in our effort to stick to our primary purpose, helping alcoholics achieve and maintain sobriety.

By being willing to stick close to our primary purpose, by being willing to actually carry the message physically out of our meeting space, we as a group have made our statement--if you attend a meeting at our group, you will hear the message of Alcoholics Anonymous, and if you watch us, you will see the message of Alcoholics Anonymous in action.

By being a member of a group that participates in the Fifth Tradition as an activity as well as an idea, I find myself more aware of what I was taught from the beginning: The Traditions apply to my personal life as well as to my group. Just as the primary purpose of my AA group is to carry the message, as a member of AA, my primary purpose also is to carry the message. I may not always like the little sacrifices of time and effort, but I am never confused as to what saving my life by God was really all about. The Twelfth Step and the Fifth Tradition make it clear that my sobriety is not only for me--it is for you. Thank God I belong to a group that acts the same way.

SPONSORSHIP CORNER:

Is there any one best way of sponsoring a newcomer?

The answer is no. All members are free to approach sponsorship as their own individual experiences and personalities may suggest. Some sponsors adopt a more or less brusque, "Take it or leave it" approach in dealing with newcomers. Others exhibit extreme patience and great personal interest in the people they sponsor. Still others are somewhat casual, content to let the new person take the initiative in asking questions or seeking help in special situations.

Each approach is sometimes successful and sometimes fails. The sponsor has to decide which to try in a particular case. The experienced sponsor recognizes the importance of flexibility in working with newcomers, does not rely on a single approach, and may try a number of different approaches with the same person.

How can a sponsor explain the A.A. program?

Sponsors will want to explain A.A. in the manner that each finds most natural and most likely to be clear to the newcomer at hand.

Experience shows that the newcomer usually cannot absorb the entire A.A. program in the first few months. Certainly, "little steps for tiny feet" applies here.

Many sponsors make sure to tell the new arrival that A.A. has one primary purpose - to help them both keep away from the first drink. They remind the newcomer that the First Step - recognizing that one has a problem - is a key part of recovery.

These sponsors remind the newcomer that A.A. offers a practical program, and that it has already helped more than a million men and women. They suggest the need for open-mindedness in facing alcoholism as a personal problem, and they underscore the fact that it is up to the newcomer alone to decide whether he or she is an alcoholic and whether A.A. can help.

Nearly all members who work with newcomers look upon the A.A. program in terms of their own experience. They tell the new person that no one speaks for A.A. and that every member is perfectly free to arrive at an individual understanding of the problem.

Some sponsors talk about the program in a more spiritual way than others do. But nearly all call attention to the source of strength to be found in "a Power greater than ourselves." Again, the sponsor points out, it is up to the newcomer to determine what that A.A. phrase means. It expresses an idea that people of many faiths - or of no particular faith - can and do accept with complete harmony.

Anonymity at the media level

Q. What if I appear as an A.A. member on TV, in a film, or allow my picture to be used in a newspaper or magazine, but do not give my full name? Is this considered an anonymity break?

A. Yes, if full-face photographs and other easily identifiable photos of A.A. members (who are *described* as A.A. members) are published or broadcast, even though their names are not given, these are considered anonymity breaks.

Q. I've heard a number of people, inside and outside of A.A. , say the newsworthy A.A. members should be encouraged to help promote the Fellowship. Why does A.A. continue to maintain the Tradition of anonymity for celebrities and other members?

A. Those Traditions developed out of the experience of the early members. At first, they too felt that well-known A.A. members could help the Fellowship by breaking their anonymity. But it soon became apparent that, if one anonymity breaker stepped forward, others would follow; and if members were to strive for public acclaim and power, the spiritual unity so essential to the work of helping fellow alcoholics would soon be lost.

Q. What about videotapes of talks and meetings? Are these considered to be anonymity breaks, since people are seen full-face and clearly identify themselves as A.A. members?

A. In 1980, the General Service Conference recommended that ". . . A.A. members who are requested to videotape talks and meetings, preserve anonymity at the level of press, radio, TV, film, and videotapes, realizing that anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions." They further recommend that talks by A.A. members as *members* be given "in person, rather than be videotaped, in view of the temptation of videotaping to place personalities before principles," and thus encourage the development of a "star" system in A.A.
