Step Four: “Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.”

"Fearless and Searching"

“My self-analysis has frequently been faulty .

Sometimes I've failed to share my defects with the right people; at other times, I've confessed their defects, rather than my own; and still other times, my confession of defects has been more in the nature of loud complaints about my circumstances and my problems.”

STEP NO. 4 -- “*Made searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.*” The intent and purpose of this step is plain. All alcoholics have a definite need for a good self-analysis -- a sort of self-appraisal. Other people have certainly analyzed us, appraised us, criticized us and even judged us. It might be a good idea to judge ourselves, calmly and honestly. This is not a list of past offenses but an attempt to determine our present character or personality. We need an inventory because

- 1. Either our faults, weaknesses, defects of character -- are the cause of our drinking -- OR
- 2. Our drinking has weakened our character and let us drift into all kinds of **wrong actions, wrong attitudes, wrong viewpoints**. In either event we obviously need an inventory and the only kind of inventory to make is a **GOOD** one. Moreover, the job is up to **US**. **WE** created or **WE** let develop all the anti-social actions that got **US** in wrong. So **WE** have got to work it out. We must make out a list of **OUR** faults and then **WE** must do something about it.

The inventory must be four things --

1. It must be **HONEST**. Why waste time fooling ourselves with a phony list. We have fooled ourselves for years. We tried to fool others and now is a good time to look ourselves squarely in the eye.
2. It must be **SEARCHING**. Why skip over a vital matter lightly and quickly. Our trouble is a grave mental illness, confused by abnormal thinking. Therefore, we must **SEARCH** diligently and fearlessly to get at the **TRUTH** of what is wrong with us -- just dig in and **SEARCH**.
3. It must be **FEARLESS**. We must not be afraid we might find things in our heart, mind, and soul that we will hate to discover. If we do find such things they may be the **ROOT** of our trouble.
4. It must be **MORAL** inventory. Some, in error, think the inventory is a lot of unpaid debts plus a list of unmade apologies. Our trouble goes much deeper. We will find that the root of our trouble lies in -
- **RESENTMENTS -- FALSE PRIDE -- ENVY -- JEALOUSY -- SELFISHNESS** and many other things. Laziness is an important one. In other words we are making an inventory of our character -- our attitude toward others -- our way of living, We are not preparing financial statement. We will pay our bills all right, because we cannot even begin to practice A.A. without **HONESTY**.

Tradition Four

“Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or AA as a whole.”

A member who does any amount of traveling finds the A.A. spirit much the same everywhere. But apart from this inward kinship, there are vast differences among groups. Here, the traveler finds three members discussing the Steps in somebody's living room; there, 300 listening to speakers in a church auditorium. In one part of the U.S., respectful silence greets the speaker who begins, “My name is Ann, and I am an alcoholic.” In another, everybody happily shouts, “Hi, Ann!” And in many other places, she may introduce herself with her full name—at a one-hour meeting or a 90-minute meeting. In each neighborhood in every part of the world reached by A.A., the local group is free to work out its own customs.

As always, freedom brings responsibility. Because each group is autonomous, it's up to each group to avoid any action that might harm A.A. And there have been such actions—or this Tradition would be unnecessary. “Implicit throughout A.A.'s Traditions,” Bill W. wrote, “is the confession that our Fellowship has its sins. We admit that we have character defects as a society and these defects threatens us continually.”

Blown up to multiple size, the Big Ego may inspire one group to take over all the public information work for its area, without consulting any of the other local groups. Once the group has decided, “We have all the answers,” the lid's off. The group may then decide that, let's say, the Eleventh Tradition is an outdated technicality: “This is a competitive age! We're going to come right out and give A.A. some good, vigorous promoting!” To the general public, this one conspicuous group is A.A. Its antics reflect, not only on the ignored neighboring groups, but on the entire Fellowship.

In a way, the Fourth Tradition is like the Fourth Step: It suggests that the A.A. group should take honest inventory of itself, asking about each of its independently planned actions, “Would this break any Tradition?” Like the individual member who chooses to make the Steps his or her guide toward happy sobriety, the wise group recognizes that the Traditions are not hindering technicalities—they are proved guides toward the chief objective of all A.A. groups....

“4.—With respect to its own affairs, each A.A. group should be responsible to no other authority than its own conscience. But when its plans concern the welfare of neighboring groups also, those groups ought to be consulted. And no group, regional committee, or individual should ever take any action that might greatly affect A.A. as a whole with out conferring with the trustees of The Alcoholic Foundation.* On such issues our common welfare is paramount.”

The official Meeting Guide is a free of charge meeting finder app for iOS and Android that provides meeting information from A.A. service entities in an easy-to-access format.

Meeting Guide syncs with area, district, intergroup/central offices and international General Service Office websites (some of which are listed on A.A. Near You), relaying meeting information from more than 300 A.A. service entities directly to you. Over 100,000 weekly meetings are currently listed, and the information is refreshed twice daily.

This app gives A.A. service entities full control of their local meeting information while collecting it in one place, making it easy for anyone to find a meeting. Local entities provide their meeting information voluntarily. Meeting Guide users can suggest additions or corrections to meeting listings by using links provided within the app to contact the local service entity responsible for the information.

Search — Find A.A meetings by name or location, in addition to day and time

Daily Reflections — a selection of reflections by and for A.A. members

Enhanced location functionality

Expanded user interface, with a new menu bar and “Contact” feature.

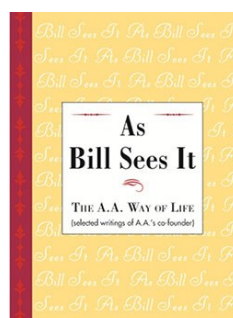
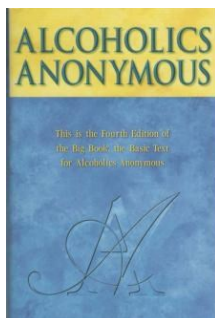
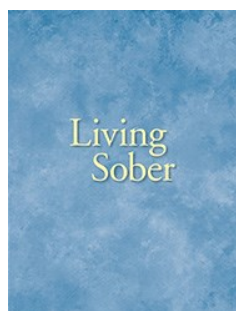
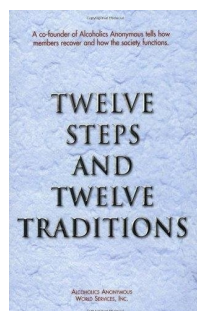
Worcester Area Intergroup's New Online Bookstore

This directory lists over 100 different Groups—each group hosting from 1 to more than a dozen scheduled ‘meetings.’ Each group listed displays how to connect or enter the group, the time(s) of the meetings (in local or Daylight Savings time), a brief description of the format style of the meeting, and URLs/telephone numbers or other relevant access info. Besides English, the list includes meetings offered in 12 other languages, and, meetings hosted in the U.S., Canada, and many other countries.

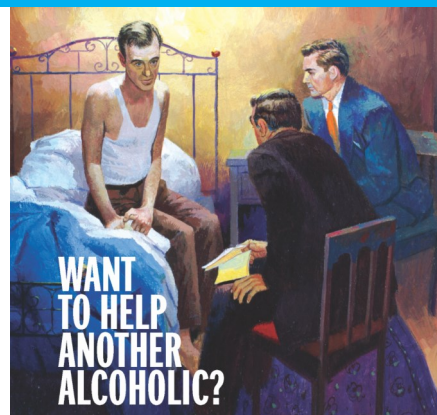

A Guide to using Zoom as a Virtual Meeting Platform

The New York City area has been hard hit by the COVID-19 virus, and the NY Intergroup has a helpful guide for using Zoom as a virtual meeting platform, addressing topics such as:

Virtual Meetings face their own challenges

According to the *New York Times*, some A.A. groups hosting virtual meetings on Zoom have had problems with internet trolls (they are under quarantine, too) who are jumping into public Zoom calls and using the platform's screen-sharing feature to project graphic (and sometimes pornographic) content to unwitting conference participants, forcing hosts to shut down their events. This practice is apparently called "Zoom Bombing."

Thankfully, the Inter-Group Association of A.A. New York offers a helpful 4 page guide, '**NYIG Toolkit for Handling Unwanted Meeting Disruptions**' [download: https://www.nyintergroup.org/wp-content/uploads/2020/03/NYIG_Zoom-Protection-Guide_033020.pdf] addressing concerns such as:

- What should you do if your meeting is disrupted?
- Turn off a Participant's Video and Remove Participant, and, Locking a Meeting
- Preventing "Zoom Group Chat" Abuse, and, Preventing "Share Screen" Abuse

HALT Line Volunteers needed

What the HALT line is:

One alcoholic talking to another alcoholic --- Isn't that what A.A. is all about?

One might:

- *Give out meeting time and location information.
- *Talk and/or listen to a sober alcoholic in danger of picking up a drink.
- *Talk and/or listen to a sober alcoholic who is visiting the area.
- *Talk to a "drunk". You may be the link in the chain that could save their life.
- *Refer a caller to the Intergroup Office and inform them of the office hours.

This is a very easy way to do service from the convenience of your own home.

What you need to be a volunteer:

*1 year of sobriety is suggested because the first year needs focus on recovery before such service.

*Meeting lists (we suggest District 26 and Worcester Area). These are available free of charge from Worcester Area Intergroup and are available on the Website www.aaworcester.org or use the App MeetingGuide on your cell phone.



*3 or more hours of time during the week that you will be available to answer calls. This is done from your own home or cell phone. You do not have to answer as A.A. you can simply answer and when asked say you are "Answering for Worcester Area Intergroup, how can I help you?"

As you know, one of the more "slippery" places in the journey to sobriety is between the door of the facility and the nearest A.A. group or meeting. Some of us can tell you that, even though we heard of A.A. in treatment, we were too fearful to go."
