Having had a spiritual awakening as a result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.

Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

The conference shall observe the spirit of AA tradition, taking care that it never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power: that sufficient operating funds and reserve be its prudent financial principle; that it place none of its members in a position of unqualified authority over others; that it reach all important decisions by discussion, vote, and whenever possible, by substantial unanimity; that its actions never be personally punitive nor an incitement to public controversy; that it never perform acts of government, and that, like the society it serves, it will always remain democratic in thought and action.

Traditions Checklist

These questions were originally published in the AA Grapevine in conjunction with a series on the Twelve Traditions that began in November 1969 and ran through September 1971. While they were originally intended primarily for individual use, many AA groups have since used them as a basis for wider discussion.

- 11. Should I keep my AA membership a secret, or reveal it in private conversations when that may help another alcoholic (and therefore me)? Is my brand of AA so attractive that other drunks want it?
- 12. What is my real importance among more than a million AAs?

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SPONSORSHIP CORNER:

For the person seeking a sponsor

How should a sponsor be chosen?

The process of matching newcomer and sponsor is as informal as everything else in AA. Often, the new person simply approaches a more experienced member who seems compatible, and asks that member to be a sponsor. Most A.A.'s are happy and grateful to receive such a request.

An old A.A. saying suggests, "Stick with the winners." It's only reasonable to seek a sharing of experience with a member who seems to be using the A.A. program successfully in everyday life. There are no specific rules, but a good sponsor probably should be a year or more away from the last drink— and should seem to be enjoying sobriety.

Should sponsor and newcomer be as much alike as possible?

Often a newcomer feels most at ease with a sponsor of similar background and interests-another physician or another homemaker, another churchgoer or another agnostic, another Irish-American or another black. But many A.A.s say they were greatly helped by sponsors totally unlike themselves. Maybe that's because their attention was then focused on the most important things that any sponsor and newcomer have in common: alcoholism and recovery in A.A.

A.A. experience does suggest that it is best for men to sponsor men, women to sponsor women. This custom usually promotes quick understanding and reduces the likelihood of emotional distractions that might take the newcomer's mind off the purpose of A.A.

What should a newcomer expect from a sponsor?

An A.A. sponsor does not provide any such services as those offered by a social worker, a doctor, a nurse, or a marriage counselor. A sponsor is simply a sober alcoholic who helps the newcomer solve one problem: how to stay sober.

And it not professional training that enables a sponsor to give help-it is just personal experience and observation. A sponsor was once a newcomer, too, and has tried to use the A.A, program to deal with problems similar to those the newcomer is facing now.

Bill Broke his anonymity-but not the anonymity Tradition-at his first meeting with Dr. Bob.

"Bill" the Akron surgeon later recalled, "was the first living human with whom I had ever talked who knew what he was talking about in regard to alcoholism-from actual experience." Bob got sober.

The A.A. member who refuses to give his name on a personal level to provide help for a sick alcoholic is placing personalities before principles. Just as surely as is the A.A. member who identifies himself at the media level. Our Tradition designates the exact level where the line should be held.

We do not hide our alcoholism in guilty secrecy out of fear or shame. That would actually strengthen ever further the cruel stigma that unfortunately surrounds the victims of our illness.

We remain anonymous in the public media for two reasons: (1) our promise of privacy to the still suffering alcoholic and his or her family, and (2) a spiritual reason, summed up in tradition Twelve, or in the word "Humility"

Anonymity Quiz

We'd like to share some examples heard "around the tables" in A.A. do you think, in the first four, it's a question of two much anonymity? Do some members carry the Tradition too far for practical purposes?

The last three are a question of not enough anonymity. They are examples of anonymity breaks, which, according to our Eleventh and Twelfth Traditions, are not in keeping with the spiritual foundation of our Fellowship. Do you agree?

Too Much anonymity?

- 1."Joan A. is in the hospital and would like cards and visitors."
- 2. "john D. is chairman of the new hope Group, if you need a contact."
- 3. "Barbara B. told me she wants to talk with you, but I can't give you her number, because this is an anonymous program."
- 4. "what do you mean, tell my doctor I'm an alcoholic? This is an anonymous program. Let him figure it out!"

Not enough anonymity?

- "Jane told me, now that she's the president of the P.T.A., she's going to let the school newspaper interview her. She really feels breaking her anonymity would do a great deal of good, since she's well known."
- There's a new book by an A.A. who uses her own name and tells her whole story—about being an alcoholic housewife how joined A.A.
- "tune in next week when Ron Darling will tell you in his own words about his bout with alcoholism and his recovery in Alcoholics Anonymous!"

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THE HOME GROUP:

Social committee is Planning events they meet 3rd Thursday at Intergroup

It Takes people to get the group jobs done. Most of us agree that A.A. ought never be "organized". However, without endangering our commitment to preserve our spiritual and democratic Fellowship we can "create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve". (Tradition Nine) In A.A. groups, these trusted servants are called "officers" and usually are chosen by the group for limited terms to service. As Tradition Two reminds us, "Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern."

Each group determines the minimum length of sobriety for A.A. members to be eligible for any position (office). The general guideline might be stable sobriety of six months to a year, or longer.

These jobs may have titles. But titles in A.A. do not bring authority or honor; they describe services and responsibilities. And it has generally been found that giving members jobs solely to help them stay sober does not work; instead the group's welfare is of primary concern in choosing officers, At election time, a review of Traditions One and Two can be helpful.

Individual groups have many ways of making sure the necessary services are preformed with a minimum of organization. (chart of service structure not included it may be found in the pamphlet "the A.A. Group pg. 24)

Following are the offices established by numerous groups in order to serve the group "at home" and in the community at large.

Chairperson: Group chairpersons serve for a period of specified period of time (usually six months to a year) experience suggests that they should have been sober awhile, at least a year; and ideally they have held other group offices first. The chairperson coordinates activities with other group officers-and those members assume the responsibility for literature, hospitality, coffee making, programming individual meetings within the group, and other vital functions. The more informed that chairpersons and other group officers are about A.A. as a whole, the better they function. By keeping Tradition One firmly in mind and encouraging members to become familiar with all the Traditions, they will help to ensure a healthy A.A. group.

Secretary: Like chairpersons, secretaries need to be good all-round group servants. For groups that have no chairpersons, they may perform the tasks associated with that position. Each group has it's own procedures, but unless other officers or committees are in the picture, the secretary generally is expected to:

Announce and/or mail information about important A.A. activities and events.

Maintain and update a strictly confidential file of names, addresses, and telephone numbers of group members (subject to each members approval) and know which ones are available for Twelfth-Step calls.

Keep records of members anniversaries, if the group so wishes.

Maintain a bulletin board for posting A.A. announcements, bulletins and newsletters. (continued on pg. 8)
