Joint Treatment Facilities Seminar

Did you miss District 25 and Worcester Area Intergroup's Joint Treatment Facilities seminar on Saturday, March 12??!! You missed an excellent day! I am grateful for all those that participated in their event. Bravo!!

Since AA co-founders first stayed sober by carrying the AA message into hospitals, many other alcoholics have discovered the great value to their own sobriety of working with suffering alcoholics in treatment facilities. In 1934, Bill W. kept trying to help drunks in Towns Hospital in New York City. None of them seemed interested at that time, but Bill stayed sober. Dr. Bob worked with thousands of alcoholics at St. Thomas Hospital in Akron, Ohio. In 1939, Rockland State Hospital, a New York mental institution, was the site of one of our first AA hospital groups. Today many AA meetings take place in treatment facilities all over the world. Twelfth Stepping and sponsoring other alcoholics where they are has long been one of the most important and satisfying ways of keeping ourselves sober.

The primary purpose of a treatment facilities committee is the same throughout the United States and Canada, to carry the AA message to the alcoholic who still suffers. To quote Chapter 7 of the Big Book: "Practical experience shows that nothing will so much insure immunity from drinking as intensive work with other alcoholics. It works when other activities fail...Carry this message to other alcoholics! You can help when no one else can. You can secure their confidence when others fail."

The Joint Treatment Facility Committee has regular monthly meetings on the 4th Saturday of the month at WAI. To keep groups informed of our activities, the chairperson attends monthly District and WAI meetings. If your group does not have a Group Service Rep or an Intergroup Rep, suggest they do to keep informed. Better yet, become a Treatment Facilities Rep and get first hand information at our monthly meeting. Isn't it time for your group to carry the message to the still suffering alcoholic? Please contact Sue N. at treatment@rcn.com or at for more information. We currently are helping seven facilities set up commitments.

The seminar opened with a viewing of the video "Hope: Alcoholics Anonymous". The Joint Treatment Facilities Committee of District 25 and WAI in conjunction with Area 30 JTFC presented this seminar. Treatment facilities committees are formed to coordinate the work of individual AA members and groups who are interested in carrying our message of recovery to alcoholics in treatment facilities, and to set up a means of "Bridging the Gap" from the facility to an AA group in the individual's community. According to the AA 2001 Membership Survey, 32% of our members came from treatment facilities.

Anne Marie M., AA Treatment History: Several treatment facilities for alcoholism exist today including, but not limited to, correctional facilities, outpatient programs, mental health facilities, hospitals, asylums, 28-day programs, and 3-5-day programs. Alcoholics Anonymous, without affiliation to any of these programs, carries the message of sponsorship into these facilities and assists those in treatment in getting to area meetings.

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Joint Treatment Facilities Seminar /Continued

Ray K., Bridging the Gap: Because the transition from treatment facility to home can be a difficult one, Alcoholics Anonymous has established a program called "Bridging the Gap", which offers temporary contact telephone numbers to the newly sober alcoholic. Bridging the Gap can be reached at 1-800-332-4334.

Ken W., CPC (Cooperation with Professional Community) Committee: The committee carries the message of Alcoholics Anonymous to professionals such as treatment facilities, courts, hospitals, etc. This message is carried in the form of videos, the AA Grapevine magazine, meeting lists, books such as the Twelve & Twelve, Living Sober, and the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous, as well as the pamphlets "Understanding Anonymity", "A Newcomer Asks", Problems Other Than Alcohol", among others.

The following treatment facilities were represented at the seminar:

- Deveraux located in Rutland is an integrated treatment unit treating adolescent boys and girls 13-18
 years of age. This is a 6-9 or 12-month program with workshops in substance abuse as well as relapse
 prevention.
- Worcester State Hospital, Psychiatric Treatment Center is a locked, short stay, psychiatric unit established in 1993. The average length of stay is 6 days, providing approximately 700 admissions per year with 26 available beds. Thirty to ninety per cent of the patients are suffering from substance abuse issues as well as psychiatric symptoms.
- Spectrum House located in Westborough is a 6- or 9-month residential treatment facility. Programs include detox, primary care, transitional, and re-entry with no outside contact for the first 30 days.

Seminar concluded with a Q&A session.

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
