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

A.A.'s Twelve Traditions were originally published in a series of articles starting with the May 1946 issue of the Grapevine.

hese are what we consider the Long Form of the Traditions. For the next several years, Bill W. traveled around the country explaining the Traditions and trying to get members to become more familiar with them. In 1949, A.A. member Earl T. of Chicago initially suggested to Bill that he rewrite the A.A. Traditions, stating that they were too long. Bill worked on shortening the Traditions with the idea of producing a concise statement for information and instructional purposes that could be printed along with the Twelve Steps.

In a letter dated June 17, 1949, Bill explained the following about the "short form" of the Traditions. He wrote, "Accordingly, I have worked over the material once more, coming up with what I hope is a quieter and clearer job — something which would be a more fitting companion to the Twelve Steps themselves and of just about the same wordage.

After many searches through the years, the Archives staff has been unable to find any documentation by Bill as to why he chose to include the additional line in Tradition Two, "Our leaders are but trusted servants, they do not govern." In their search they turned up a letter written by former G.S.O. Archivist Frank M.:

"As you'll recall historically, the climate was not fully positive for 'organizing' Alcoholics Anonymous in the late '40s and early '50s. Folks thought things might get too complicated if Traditions were to come on line and a General Service Conference started. They worried about 'control issues.' Thus the line about 'our leaders are but trusted servants, they do not govern' was added to allay these fears."

Admission Was Not Enough For This Alcoholic

Now wait just a minute! Didn't I just admit I was powerless over alcohol and that my life was unmanageable? Isn't that enough?

I have no problem with the thing Higher Power

thing. I have believed in God since I was a small child. It is the insanity aspect I don't care for. I am NOT insane!

Ok, Ok, drinking until I blacked out every night was a little crazy now that I think of it. Isolating myself from family and friends because I would rather drink isn't exactly "normal". Could that be insane? Maybe...

That's how I thought 16 years ago. Now I know the definition of insanity is doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results. Let me tell you a little story.

I have suffered from anxiety, depression and OCD for a long time. My OCD was not the "cleaning kind", but a more debilitating version. I had to constantly count things, I had to have my 3 sets of silverware in a certain order, I had to keep going back to make sure whatever appliance I was using was turned off. You get the picture.

After being in the program for a short period of time, I decided to jump in with both feet. This meant I would do the steps and follow suggestions. Over time, my obsession with

alcohol was relieved. My life became more manageable. And, believe it or not, some of the more debilitating aspects of my OCD were relieved.

Did my Higher Power do this for me, restored me to sanity? Yes, I came to believe this.

Concept 2:

The General Service Conference of A.A. has become, for nearly every practical purpose, the active voice and the effective conscience of our whole Society in its world affairs.

The Voice of AA

Concept 1 tells us the members and groups are the ones who make the decisions. Concept 2 tells us the General Service Conference (GSC) is the face and voice of A.A. in worldwide affairs. Some might think that this contradicts the first concept, but it doesn't. Let's take another look at it to see how they work together:

Concept 1:

Final responsibility and ultimate authority for A.A. world services should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole Fellowship.

That "collective conscience" is represented by the delegates to the GSC. These delegates are elected by their fellow AAs in their home groups.

When AA groups confirmed the permanent charter for the GSC, they delegated the task of maintenance of our World Services to the delegates. SOMEONE had to oversee the GSC and be the face of A.A. to the public.

Every April the Delegates from the 93 areas in the US and Canada meet for 6 days with the Trustees of the General Service Board, the staffs of General Service Office and The Grapevine, and other service workers.

The first GSC was held in April, 1951 at the Commodore Hotel in New York. Bill W. would later write that: "The delegates... listened to reports from the Board of Trustees and from all of the services. There was warm but cordial debate on many questions of A.A. policy... [It was proved] as never before that A.A.'s Tradition Two was correct: Our group conscience could safely act as the sole authority and sure guide for Alcoholics Anonymous."

While the GSC is the active voice and face of AA, its power is limited and controlled by the membership. They cannot, for example, change the 12 Steps, 12 Traditions or Article 12 of the Conference Charter, probably THE most important article!

The very first thing it says is that the General Service Conference shall observe the spirit of the A.A. Tradition in ALL it's proceedings. They are also tasked with making sure the Conference does not become a 'seat of perilous wealth or power', insuring there are sufficient operating fund with an ample prudent reserve. There are several more items the Conference is tasked with which will be discussed next month!

Pandemic Hits Publishing: GSO is Out of Big Books

Add another victim to the Covid crisis... the Big Book.

Jan W, our Area 30 delegate, told the Eastern Massachusetts 2022 Kickoff Assembly last month that "a higher than expected demand for the English hardcover Big Book in the last quarter of 2021" means that New York has run out of them.

New York cannot get enough paper to print more because of Covid-caused supply chain problems. AAWS Publishing says the earliest it can hope to get another print run started and have the books back in stock is in mid-February.

Big Books are still available locally, however. Intergroup still has several cases in stock.

The forerunner to today's Intergroup / Central Offices, the Central Committee, was established in Cleveland Ohio in October 1939, four years after AA's co-founders Bill W. and Dr. Bob met.



Two Of a Kind: **Tradition 2 & Step 2**

Tradition Two (Short Form):

For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as he may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern."

Step Two:

"We came to be aware that a power greater than ourselves could re store us to sanity."

The Steps and the Traditions do not normally match.

They do here.

The 12 Steps show us how to live as sober alcoholics and have a life that is generally "happy, joyous, and free." Following the steps help us survive.

Following the 12 Traditions are how a group, Intergroup, District, Area, GSO, etc., survives.

Step Two talks about "a power greater than ourselves," while Tradition Two comes right out and identifies that power as: "a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience."



Both deal with the power of God. In Step 2, it is about God restoring our own sanity. In Tradition 2, it is about God leading us as a group to act sanely.

Once you have done your own fourth step, you know how insane you have been. (That's just looking at what you actually did, not what you thought about doing.) And after you have attended and participated in some AA business meetings you know how insane we can be as a group.

I'm not just talking about the grandiose insanity that so many of us recognized and admitted to in our fourth steps, like getting married in a Los Vegas wedding chapel

> to the "love of your life" you met in the bar two hours earlier, or guitting your job because you didn't get the raise, promotion, or assignment you wanted and were "too good for that !&@#\$! group of idiots." They didn't deserve an employee of your caliber.

Nor am I talking about the grandiose insanity of a group using its 7th Tradition to rent a boat for a group outing or deciding to invest its "prudent reserve" in

Tradition Two shows us that our groups can do the same through our group con-

science. But a group conscience is more than a group of people making quick decisions, such as picking a topic for the day's discussion or where to go for coffee after the meeting. What we are looking for is an "informed group conscience."

Here's how it is explained in **The AA Group**, a pamphlet put out by GSO in 1995:

"The term 'informed group conscience' implies that pertinent information has been studied and all views have been heard before the group votes...This is achieved by the group members through the sharing of full information, individual points of view, and the practice of AA principles. To be fully informed requires a willingness to listen to minority opinions with an open mind. On sensitive issues, the group works



slowly, discouraging formal motions until a clear sense of its collective view emerges."

As Tradition Two shows us, an informed group conscience is how God expresses Himself, and why the group should follow it.

Came, Came to Came to Believe

Step 2:

"Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity"

Why don't you choose your own conception of God?...It was only a matter of being willing to believe in a Power greater than myself.

Nothing more was required of me to make my beginning.

Bill's Story, Big Book

For the beginner, it's such a challenge. First to admit that you are a alcoholic, then, in the same sentence, that your life is unmanageable. Now comes the God thing: "a Power greater than ourselves"

In Step 1 we talk about being powerless. In two we talk about the one that is all powerful.

When I first came into AA, I had my own conception of God from when I grew up, as a Catholic. I was an altar boy, involved with the youth group, and with the church for most of my young adult life. I strayed after as my drinking and escapades increased..

Coming into AA, I was all geared up to talk about the Church along with what ideas I had about God. I had resentments, large ones. How come God had left my life? Why was I cursed with the life I had? Where was God when I called out to Him? Why was I cursed with this disease?

God and I needed to have a talk.

But when I came in, I quickly found out that it has nothing to do with the God we grew up with. The concept of God yes, but the religious aspect that goes along with that God, the deity if you will, does not come into play. The founders were quick to realize that being associated with a specific religion would prevent other alcoholics from seeking help if they thought they would have to change their religion.

We are not religious. We are, however, a spiritual program.

In the Big Book, Ebby and Bill are having a discussion at the kitchen table and Bill offers Ebby a drink. Ebby turns it down and tells Bill that he got religion in his life from a group known as the Oxford Group. Bill and Ebby discuss it further with Bill having his reservations about religion. It is in that discussion where we first hear the statement "why not try your own conception of God."

My first thought is that whatever my concept of God/Higher Power is would not do justice to whatever that power or being is. We may have a preconceived idea as to what it may be, but the longer we stay in the program, the more our relationship with that Higher Power grows and changes.

The moment I realized that I could have a conversation with my God, ask questions, ask for direction, or turn over whatever I can't handle, my life began to change.

At the end of the statement of the second step, it says "could restore us to sanity". Merrian-Webster's definition of sanity is "soundness of mind." At first, I questioned the statement. I felt that this inferred that I was not sane at the time. Was I insane?

Then I began to think about it. The thoughts that would come into my head when I first came in that kept telling me that I've been sober for a few weeks or months. I got this now. I know I can control this, or maybe drink just one beer next time.

How insane is that? Am I in touch with reality?

Think of the story we read in the Big Book where the salesman goes out in the country to try to sell some cars. He stops at a diner and is feeling good about himself and decides that having a shot of whiskey in his milk would be a "good idea," or the story about the jaywalker who keeps running into traffic. How sane was their thinking? Then I began to think, how rational was my thinking during the time of my drinking. The *insanity* in my head was the result of my drinking. I have a *disease*; it is called *alcoholism*. It is a threefold disease: spiritual, physical, and mental. I need to address all of three aspects of it if I want to succeed. I do that by talking with my higher power daily, going to meetings, working my program, and trying to help another alcoholic. With this I gain serenity, peace of mind and a better life. It is well worth it.


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

Open District Positions – February 2022

Alternate District Committee Member

District committee members (D.C.M.s) are essential links between the group G.S.R.s and the area delegate to the General Service Conference. D.C.M.s pass on their district's thinking to area committees and service workers. They carry information back to local G.S.R.s, who in turn keep their group members informed on various A.A. issues.

- The DCM or Alternate is responsible for attending the monthly Area 30 committee meetings in Belmont or virtually on the fourth Wednesday of each month. The DCM or Alternate is responsible to attend the five Area 30 assemblies each year.
- The DCM or Alternate is the essential link between the District 25 committee, and the Area 30 committee, representing the group conscience to the Area, and carrying critical information back into the District from Area 30.

Public Information Committee Chair

Responsible for creating greater understanding of — and preventing misunderstandings of — the A.A. program through the public media, electronic media, P.I. meetings, and speaking to community groups.

Public Information (P.I.) in Alcoholics Anonymous means carrying the message of recovery to the still-suffering alcoholic by informing the general public about the A.A. program. We carry the message by getting in touch with the media, schools, industry, and other organizations which can report on the nature and purpose of A.A. and what it can do for alcoholics.

As our co-founder Bill W. wrote: "Public Information takes many forms – the simple sign outside a meeting place that says "A.A. meeting tonight;" listing in local phone directories; distribution of A.A. literature; and radio and television shows using sophisticated media techniques. Whatever the form, it comes down to "one drunk carrying the message to another drunk," whether through personal contact or through the use of third parties and the media."
