Letting My Sponsor Sponsor Me

While I always thought he was a pretty bright guy, since I began actually *taking* the suggestions he gives me, (instead of just noting that they make good sense), my sponsor has mysteriously become *brilliant*. I asked him to sponsor me about 18 months ago when I realized though I still kept contact with the man that had taken me through the steps, I hadn't used him as a sponsor in a couple of years. I felt like I was a bit of a loose cannon, and was getting scared about the probability that my ego might balloon (more) without having someone to whom I was accountable.

So I asked a man I'll call Ralph, because I don't know anyone named Ralph. Why Ralph? Well, he was my tenth step pal, so he knew all my personal stuff anyway. I figured it would be an easy transition. I also respected him, and the program he worked. I admired the way he handled himself in the real world. He really did practice these principles in *all* his affairs, not just in a church basement for an hour. Ralph also had a sponsor, and was willing to be held accountable. I knew he was in pursuit of the truth because of all we had already shared. Because of the many tenth steps we had done together, I also knew he was human, and made mistakes regularly as I do.

In retrospect, I chose him partly because of ego. He was my tenth step friend, we finished our 5^{th} steps around the same time, and frankly, my ego *had* ballooned to the point where I just couldn't find anyone deserving of the privilege of sponsoring me. So, I figured Ralph who was, in my estimation, my *equal*, was the best I could find.

I traveled another year down the path, telling myself I had a sponsor because I called Ralph every week and asked for suggestions. Yet, I continued to handle certain things myself. I did my best to listen at times, but always in the back of my mind was this desire to keep my image as a guy that has it figured out, a guy that might have difficulties, but is clearly connected with God and in no trouble. Subconsciously, it was still important for me to look good to some degree in my sponsor and friend's eyes.

A couple months ago, I was finally desperate enough to be humble. I had just finished reading a mini-fourth step, (or extended tenth step, call it what you will) that I had written. Humbled, I confessed what I had learned about my drive to impress him, to look good and to be a "guru", in spite of protestations that I never wanted that. I subconsciously believed that knowledge of the book, courting public opinion, and sounding good at meetings was the way to a healthy sobriety. Mind you, I had been duly warned about this and was on the watch, but had somehow slipped by my own security system in the dark of night. This inane notion needed to be smashed.

My struggles of the last month have been as a result of not trusting God in certain areas, in essence, remaining agnostic those areas. After a breakup with someone I really wanted to be with, I have been unable to trust God completely in the arena of relationships. I also haven't been able to trust God with my creative life. I kept coming back to believing I had to retrieve the past, there just wasn't going to be an opportunity ahead to *feel* what I had felt.

Humbled at last, and willing to listen, I called Ralph. He asked me point blank if I believed what it said on pg. 100. It was his favorite passage in the entire book <u>Alcoholics Anonymous</u>.

"You and the new man must walk in the path of spiritual progress. If you persist , remarkable things will happen. When we look back, we realize that the things which came to us when we put ourselves in God's hands were better than anything we could have planned."

"When we look back," he repeated, "we realize that the things which came to us when we put ourselves in God's hands were better than anything we could have planned."

He paused, but before I could blurt out a pat answer or another quote, he said, "Do you believe that?"

"Yes," I answered, caught off guard for the moment.

"Do you believe it *intellectually*? Or do you *really* believe it...in your *gut*?"

"I really believe it."

"Why?"

He was pressing me. Ralph is a very subdued cat; he doesn't force an issue too often. I knew he meant business.

I prayed for second, and a few things tumbled out. First, I never thought I could stop drinking, not even for a day, and looking back, I hadn't really even *thought* about drinking for *years*. On top of that, I had seen and helped men recover from alcoholism that had truly appeared to be hopeless, doomed. Most importantly, I hadn't been able to predict what it would feel like to be *recovered*, because I had never felt at peace before, not really. There had been temporary oblivion while intoxicated, but no real serenity. I had since experienced in many times. You can't really explain what a spiritual awakening feels like to someone that hasn't had one. I couldn't possibly have predicted what it would feel like.

"What about the gambling?" Ralph asked.

That had escaped me completely. I hadn't gambled in five years. The strangest thing, that was. I still can't really explain it. After gambling since I was **nine** years old and almost every day since I started the football pool in junior high school, I had suddenly lost interest all together at about a year of sobriety. I was making book at the time (which I had been doing since I was about nineteen years old), and gave it up in the middle of football season. If that isn't an act of God, I don't what is. It was just *removed*.

"Oh yeah," I said.

I said, "Thanks, Ralph, I think I get it," and hung up the phone. Amazing...he hadn't given me one opinion, hadn't told me to *do* anything. He had a way of simply asking questions that always seemed to lead me to truths I knew, but had just misplaced.

I briefly played over my options: A) the familiar pain B) the unknown, uncharted (and for some reason, still sometimes scary) territory of God's will

Surveying the claw marks on my self-will, I hit my knees, "God? PLEASE help me to see your will for me, and give me the Power to carry it out."

I'm getting the feeling that it's almost time to get excited again.
